Hello West Bedford High Families,

Please see information and important dates below for the upcoming weeks.

1. Nova Scotia Homework Hub Extended Tutoring Hours:

The Nova Scotia Homework Hub will provide extended tutoring hours in Mathematics for students in grades 7-12 from January 27th to January 29th from 5:30pm to 10:00pm. Grade 4-6 students will continue to have access to tutoring every Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday from 5:30pm to 7:30pm.

Homework Hub also provides students with video tutorials, practice exercises, vocabulary flash cards, digital math textbooks and an online graphing calculator.

Students and teachers are automatically enrolled in the **Nova Scotia Homework Hub** and access can be found through the GNSPES launch page. **Tutors** are Nova Scotia qualified mathematics teachers, and this is a *free service*.

- 2. **Grade 7/8 trip to Oval.** The Grade 7/8 students are going to the Oval tomorrow (Monday January 27th) for an open skate! Students are expected to come appropriately dressed for the weather and activities as this is an outdoor activity in the winter. Students must bring:
- Loose, comfy, weather-appropriate clothing for skating and being outside for over an hour (this is including but not limited to hat, scarf, mittens/gloves, warm winter jacket, snow pants/splash pants, warm socks, etc). A change of clothes and socks is encouraged incase the student falls on the ice and their clothing gets wet. This well help them stay dry and warm after skating;
- Lunch, snacks and a water bottle (students can eat outside at the Oval or wait until they are back <u>but students MUST</u> <u>pack a lunch as the cafeteria will not be open when you get back</u>). Skates and/or CSA approved helmet *are free rental options available at the Oval for those who don't have these items*

Field trips are an extension of school so students must follow the school code of conduct for behaviour while participating on this trip.

4. Mid-Year Summative Assessments (Grades 9-11)

If the school is closed on a scheduled exam day due to inclement weather, power failure, or other unforeseen circumstances, exams will be moved forward a day. Students must be present to write the exam on the rescheduled date. Please take this into account when planning family vacations around exam time.

Students are not required to be at school on mornings /afternoons/days when they do not have scheduled assessments. The one exception to this pertains to grade 10-11 students whose exam schedule includes a conflict between two course exams. They are required to be at school on Jan. 30th - the planned conflict day.

- 5) Examination Writing Procedures.
- When entering examination rooms, students must leave all personal belongings including backpacks, extra clothing, books, and electronics at the front of the room. Students cannot wear AirPods, headphones, etc. during the assessment.
- Students who arrive late will not be permitted to enter the exam room after the first hour is complete. Students who arrive late prior to the first hour will also not be permitted time beyond the normal 2½-hour termination of the exam.
- Students in grades 10 and 11will not be permitted to leave an exam before 1 hour of the session is complete. All Grade 9 students must remain in the room until the end of the assessment time. They are expected to bring a book, study materials for the afternoon assessment or other work they need to complete for one of their courses. Grade 9 students cannot go home early after an assessment. They are required to be at school the entire day on the days they write assessments.
- Students are not permitted to leave the examination room to go to the washroom area unless accompanied by a staff member. There is a staff member in each hallway while exams are being written.
- While exams are being written there are to be no students in the hallway. Teachers are asked to direct students to the cafeteria, library or out of the building. Administrators will assist with monitoring the halls at peak times. **Grades 7 and 8 will remain in their homeroom classrooms for the day and teachers will go to them. This is to ensure assessment areas are kept as quite spaces.**
- 6. **PowerSchool and Course Selection.** With high school course selection fast approaching, this is a reminder that students registering for grades 10- 12 <u>MUST be able to log into Power School Portal</u> to complete their registration (at either high school) and to enter their course selection. Please check in with your child NOW and oversee that they can in fact do this. If they cannot, reach out to your child's homeroom teacher to get their Portal Access Letter as soon as possible.
- 7. **Hockey at West Bedford (2025-26 school year).** We are looking to try to get both male and female Hockey up and started next year. 8. A message from our African Nova Scotia Support worker. Happy New Year! I wanted to take this time to reintroduce and for some introduce myself for the first time. I am Felisha Davidson and I am the African Student Support Worker here at West Bedford High School. I have the privilege of working with your children. My role here at West Bedford is to help provide academic support, cultural programming and student advocacy. I also work to bridge the gap between school and home to ensure student success.

Our students of African Ancestry are able to sign up to work in my culturally safe space to receive extra academic support from me, They are able to use the space on their flex periods as well or come and join me in my room 1033 at lunch hours where we have cultural programming and plan activities with our BSA (Black Student Association). We have had pot lucks and cupcake socials. We have learned about Kwanza and we have been learning about the 7 principals of the Nguzo Saba. Focusing on Umoja (Unity) and now on Kujichagulia (Self Determination).

The African Nova Scotian Student Support Worker program provides support to promote the academic success and well-being of African Nova Scotian students and students of African Ancestry through a cultural lens in knowing them as they are known in areas that impact their ability to thrive now and in their future. It is important for you to understand that participation from the student is voluntary.

Should a student be identified as needing direct support from an ANSSSW, the school administrator will go through a process with their designated school team and input from the parent/caregivers, to collectively determine the kinds of support the student needs. From there, the team identifies which school staff can provide the kind of support that is within the responsibility of the staff's job assignment.
