- 2. Provincial Assessment Grade 8- Reading, Writing, Math. During the last week of May, our grade 8 students will participate in a provincial assessment of literacy and math skills. By celebrating diversity and promoting inclusivity, schools create a more welcoming and supportive environment for all students.
